2. Do you promise to diligently teach your children the principles of our Holy Christian faith, revealed in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments and summarized in the Confession of Faith and Catechisms of this church?
3. Do you promise to pray regularly with and for your children, and to set an example of piety and godliness before them?
4. Do you promise before God and these witnesses, to endeavor by all the means of God’s appointment to bring your children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, encouraging them to appropriate for themselves the blessings and obligations of the covenant?

For the Congregation:

Do you, the congregation of the Lord, welcome these children in love, and do you promise before God to encourage and support them in our most precious faith by teaching and example and to assist their parents in their Christian nurture? Do you so promise?

A SUMMARY OF BIBLICAL TRUTH REGARDING BAPTISM

Instruction

The ordinance of baptism is administered by the church in obedience to the command of Christ that the nations should be converted, baptized and taught all that Christ has commanded them (Matthew 28:19,20). Baptism represents and seals our union with Christ, (Rom 6:1ff), the outpouring of the Holy Spirit (John 1:33), and resulting regeneration, adoption, and cleansing from sin (Titus 3:5,6). By baptism we are initiated into the covenant community (Acts 2:41), and made members of the body of Christ.

Baptism of Covenant Children

Underlying the diversity of the Biblical revelation is a unifying, singular covenant of grace. Thus Abraham had the "gospel" preached to him (Gal 3:8), he "believed God" and his faith was "credited to him as righteousness" (Gen 15:6), and he entered into a covenant with God, signified by the sign of circumcision (Rom 4:11). Yet it was commanded that this sign of his adult faith be applied to his infant child and all infant, covenant children thereafter. The reason may be found in God's promise, "I will be a God to you and to your children." (Gen 17:7) The saving purposes of God include the children of believers. Because He is their God as well as their parents', the children also receive the sign of the covenant and are initiated into the covenant community.

When we move to the New Testament, no new principle is introduced. Children are not now excluded from the covenant community. Rather, in an era which Scripture describes as a greater covenant with better promises (Heb 8:6), children have not a reduced, but a more privileged status. At Pentecost, in the delivery of the first Christian sermon, Peter said: "For the promise is for you and your children and for all who are far off, as many as the Lord our God shall call." (Acts 2:39)

The echo of the promise made to Abraham is clear. Children have the same covenantal status in the New Covenant as in the old. They are set apart, "holy," (1 Cor 7:14), members of the covenant community and recipients of the sign of the covenant. Therefore in Acts we see that whole households were baptized (Acts 16:31). When Jesus took infants into his arms and blessed them (Lk 18:15-17), He demonstrated not only that passive infants may receive grace, but also that God continues to love our children through us.

Danielle Daunais

I was raised in a loving family and grew up in the Roman Catholic faith. As a child, my family went to church every week, I attended Sunday school, and we read/discussed the Bible. Through these teachings, I had a good understanding of the principles of Christianity. However, I don't think I ever really knew the Lord, and I was definitely not living my life for Christ. Looking back, I believe that I spent much of my early years trying to build up some kind of glory for myself on this earth. Vaidotas Ickys

Jesus is the One who took me out of despair. I did not have a purpose to live. As a kid, I was disappointed, skeptical and doubting everything, trusting no one, and always alone. Around age 21, I heard about the Reformed church in Lithuania and was interested in what they were teaching about God. Out of curiosity, I started going to the church. In that church, I heard that Jesus could change my life and that I could trust Him. As always, I heard a lot of promises, but the things I heard did not seem real to me.

Nevertheless, I started reading the Bible. Romans 3:10-18 was something I needed to hear. It sounded realistic and the Holy Spirit convicted me through these and the other words in the Bible. I felt like a wretch, like a creeping worm on this earth. But now, it is different. Mark 8:34-38 were verses that struck me: *“And calling the crowd to him with his disciples, he said to them, “If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and the gospel's will save it. For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul? For what can a man give in return for his soul? For whoever is ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him will the Son of Man also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.”*

I felt such freedom when I learned that I need no more to live according to my own imagination and wisdom. Before, I had no foundation, but now on I have a real, true foundation - Jesus - who is my truth, life, and Savior.

Vita Icke

It is hard for me to say exactly when I was converted, but in the last five years, God has made tremendous changes in my life. I was raised in a nominal Catholic family. We didn't go to church, so for most of my life I didn't know much about Christ or even that there were Protestant churches out there. God started changing my life when I met Vaidotas, my future husband, with whom I began to attend the Evangelical Reformed Church in Lithuania. Also, I started studying with him in a local Bible Institute, where, for the first time, I opened the Bible not just to follow what the pastor was reading, but to read and study for myself. At that time it felt overwhelming! There seemed so much to know and comprehend... I knew so little it was difficult to even write a single page for an assignment! I was taking it slowly, but as I opened the Bible and I started to know more about God, the spirit of Christ started to change my heart and view of life. Whereas before I felt like I was standing on sand—standing upon a mixture of truth and error—now, as I came to know God from His Word, I came to stand on solid ground.

My husband always seemed to be several steps ahead of me and he served as a good example for me of one who is convicted, humble, and always seeking the Lord. His passion and hunger for Christ were admirable. I was looking more at him than myself. So I even didn't notice how my life changed. For quite some time I wasn't taking Christ personally, but the Gospel was taking root in me as I read the Bible and heard about Jesus. A couple of years ago I started profession of faith classes in church and then became a member of the church, confessing faith. And yet, as I think back, I was convicted just after that, during the worship service of Synod, by singing one of the hymns and realizing that God's only son, the Perfect Lamb of God, took all our filthy sins, including mine, and carried them in the face of God's wrath. At that moment I saw more clearly how unworthy I was to receive such a gift. God is good and gives even more gifts than we can imagine or expect! Plans were made to come to the United States so that Vaidotas could receive a solid reformed education and I finally got pregnant. Joy and so many blessings then and now! It is a great gift to have the opportunity to join this church, to finally feel and be in communion with Christians, and to sit under the faithful preaching of God's Word.

Joseph Klynstra

I, by God's good grace, was born into a Christian home. Growing up I constantly heard the Word and the Gospel, but I never grasped its trueness, or the weight of my own sin. There isn't one definite moment where I realized I was a Christian, but rather it was a gradual process of the Spirit working in me to bring me to a realization of my sins, and a realization that apart from Christ I would have to account for my sins before an infinitely holy God. Upon seeing that for every sin of commission or omission I am accountable to God, it magnified God's grace. By seeing that every sin I have ever committed or will commit has been paid for in full by Jesus Christ, the mercy and Grace of the Father couldn't be clearer. Not only is it by God's grace that I am saved, but without His grace I wouldn't even have faith.

The pinnacle of my realization of His grace came almost two years ago. I got out of work early and instead of going home I decided to go somewhere else, knowing full well that I should let my parents know I wasn't going straight home. I proceeded to leave without calling. About a mile and a half down the road, my steering went out and I ended up crashing into a tree at about 50mph. Not by luck, but by God's grace, I escaped unscathed from the wreck. Not only was God's sovereign hand over me protecting me, He was protecting me while I had clearly sinned by not calling my parents. This event shed a whole new light on the Gospel, for even while ensnared in sin, God's grace and salvation is never out of reach.

Paul Lewer

I was born into and raised in Roman Catholicism. Though I held to certain portions of a Christian worldview, such as the historical Jesus, I was not saved. By the end of high school, I was a functional atheist, though I would have never used that term. I was self-righteous to the core. I believed that all men were generally good. I didn't drink, smoke, sleep around, or cuss all that much. Because of this, I thought I was one of the best of all generally good men. My last season of high school track I was coached by a man who was different than anyone I had met thus far. He seemed different. It was subtle, but it he possessed "the peace of God" mentioned in Philippians 4:7. However, we never once talked about anything spiritual. We never talked about anything pertaining to religion.

During my freshman year of college, God in his mercy began to unsettle my confidence in my worldview and my standing among men. God was pleased to use my old track coach as an instrument in this process. It was not through this coach's strength or brilliance that God moved; rather it was in his weakness and suffering: my former coach was battling severe clinical depression. I thought, "How could this man be battling depression and rocked to his core? I thought he had everything figured out?" If my coach's peace had been shaken, shouldn't I - who didn't even have this peace - also be shaken? And so I was.

At the same time, God by the Holy Spirit began to convict me. At first I was merely unsettled, but my conviction grew. By the end of my freshman year, I knew that my soul was utterly vile. I was wicked to the core. I was restrained in sin only by my own self-preservation. I knew that if I were to die, hell would be my just reward. As I wrestled, I drew on my upbringing in Roman Catholicism. Though some doctrines were orthodox and helpful, most of what I knew proved to be more problematic. My track coach, in the midst of an intense spiritual battle of his own, was in no position to help and guide me through my own battle. He recommended I talk with a youth pastor he knew. So I did. This pastor helped to un-do many of the problematic beliefs I held.

I came to the point where I knew beyond all doubt that I needed a savior. My search turned to figuring out how I could be saved. I imagined that becoming a Christian would be immediately obvious to be by feeling. I imagined a euphoric rush or a feeling of ecstasy would accompany the new birth. I imagined feeling like a puppet, my every move guided from on high. Knowing I needed to be born again, I sought for a means whereby I would usher in this change. I thought that perhaps a prayer or incantation would do the trick. I looked for and tried any number of things. Not once did I get my Saul to Paul moment. No lightning ever struck and so I grew frustrated.

God again by his grace brought me to realize that the only thing that could usher in my salvation had already been done 2000 years prior. This realization came two weeks before returning to college for my sophomore year. There was no feeling that accompanied this realization. Nothing the least bit remarkable. Yet I knew that my life would never be the same. Indeed, I was a changed man.

Though I am prone to wander, God restores me and brings me back to Him without fail. God has been faithful to deliver me, and continues to conform me into his image. The kind discipline of the Lord through my walk with him has been a great source of comfort and assurance. I long for the day when I, with all God's people, will see Him face to face!

Damaris Lewer

I grew up in Germany in a Christian family that read the Bible and taught the biblical stories. On an intellectual level, I have believed in God and salvation by faith through Jesus Christ from an early age. However, since there were no faithful churches in our area, we rarely attended Sunday service and there was a limited amount of good theological teaching in my life. I struggled with how to make the truths of the Bible relevant to my life. When I was 16, my family moved to Boise, Idaho. We began to attend a nondenominational church and I learned a lot. However, when I entered college, I was much confused by a class taught by a member of the Jesus Seminar and went through a period of serious doubt. I ultimately realized that many of the professor's

presuppositions were problematic and decided to trust that the Bible was true. But during all this time, I was still living as though happiness was dependent on my situation in life, which left me dissatisfied. I wasn't resting in Jesus but always looking for something else to make it right. When I first met my husband about 5 years ago, he challenged me on my understanding of salvation that led to a lot of soul-searching. I was brought to a place where I became convicted of both the weight of my own sin and inadequacy, and that God's unconditional love has nothing to do with my actions. God's choice is merciful and irrevocable and now I am learning more and more to walk by faith.

Being born into a Christian family, I've been blessed to know God my entire life. Through God's Grace I was given parents who worked hard to make sure I was raised in Christ every step of my life.
